A Party for Preservation!

Harford's commitment to land preservation shines at 2019's Harvest Moon Dinner & Auction

HLT supporters raised a record \$54,000 at the eighth annual Harvest Moon Dinner & Auction on Saturday, October 19. An enthusiastic sell-out crowd of over 200 people attended the event at the Bel Air Armory to support our mission of preserving land in Harford County.

Keynote speaker, Delegate Andrew Cassilly shared stories of growing up in a large family in Harford County. Del. Cassilly spoke of the value of connecting people to the land to create a common vision for land preservation in Harford County. He added that the perpetual nature of these easements protects that legacy for generations.

The event was made possible by the donated goods and services of over 100 local businesses and residents. Harford County Register of Wills, Derek Hopkins, donated his auctioneering services, Joppa resident Jeff Conti donated his professional decorating services, and MacGregor's of Havre de Grace donated catering services.

"The outpouring of support for our event shows that our community recognizes the importance of our work and understands the many benefits of land preservation," Harford Land Trust Board President Ben Lloyd said.

A chat with our newest Board Member

Jeanne, tell us about your connections to Harford County.

I grew up in Bel Air and graduated from C. Milton Wright High School. I lived in Baltimore City for many years and am happy to be back home!

Why is preserving land in Harford County important to you?

I believe the mission of the Harford Land Trust benefits all residents of the county. Preserving agricultural lands supports family farms that in turn provide sources of locally grown food. Maintaining water and wooded habitats is imperative for species that depend on those habitats for their survival. Preserving agricultural land and wildlife habitats will also help to maintain cleaner air and water for those who live in the county and surrounding areas.

Why did you decide to become involved in HLT?

Quite simply, I became involved in HLT so that I could be part of helping to preserve the agricultural history and natural beauty of Harford County for future generations. The prospect of working closely with folks who share my passion is exciting.



Hunters and anglers were among the first to crusade for wildlife and habitat protection and remain some of today's most important conservation leaders. Recognizing the importance of rural Maryland's hunting heritage, as well as an untapped source of volunteers and advocates, former HLT Executive Director, Peg Niland, developed the Land Steward Program during her tenure at Calvert County's American Chestnut Land Trust. She launched a similar program in Harford County after joining HLT in 2006. Since then, the program has attracted hunters from all over Harford County and turned avid sportsmen into one of HLT's most valued resources.

HLT's Land Steward Program works on a simple exchange basis; volunteer hours for white-tailed deer hunting rights on HLT preserves. This symbiotic relationship reaps rewards for the hunters, HLT, and most importantly, the growth of land preservation in Harford County.

Program participant Rob Babylon puts it succinctly, "A local hunting lease could cost thousands of dollars a year elsewhere. But all HLT asks for is volunteer hours." As a result of his volunteer efforts, Rob has connected with likeminded sportsman who care deeply about HLT's mission of preserving Harford's natural resources and rural heritage. The program stoked a passion for land preservation in Rob and his son, Robby. "If we don't do something today, there will be nothing to do tomorrow." We couldn't agree more Rob.

Fulfilling the Stewardship Promise

From Volunteer Hunter to HLT Board Member: Meet Dan Krug






When Dan Krug purchased his Edgewood home in 2008, he had no idea he had taken the first step in becoming a steward for land preservation. As Dan recalls, "One day I was walking my dog in the woods adjacent to my property and saw a sign that said, 'HLT owned property: no hunting without written permission." Eager to find out more information, Dan called the number on the bottom of the sign and wound up conversing with then HLT Executive Director, Peg Niland. Peg told Dan about the volunteer Land Steward Program and he was hooked.

"Being granted hunting access in exchange for some basic stewardship duties seemed too good to be true," notes Dan. Over the years he learned that the program not only helps manage the deer population, but, for some hunters it is a gateway to becoming a passionate steward and advocate for land preservation.

As a result of his participation in the Land Steward Program Dan became increasingly involved in land preservation, eventually being asked to join the HLT Board in 2016. Dan believes spending time in his youth hunting, fishing, and hiking had a big impact on who he is today. "If we can preserve the land forever,

HLT benefits greatly from the hunters' volunteer service. The team are always present at HLT's events lending a hand and do much of the land management tasks. Hunters also serve as the eyes and ears on the properties, observing changes to the land, noting management needs, and spotting interesting wildlife.



"The program is an invaluable source of volunteer stewards. It has grown tremendously over the years and we now have a waiting list," says Kristin Kirkwood, HLT's Executive Director.

Dan's journey from sportsman to land steward is not uncommon for those involved in HLT's volunteer Land Steward Program. Dan encourages all those interested in exploring the volunteer hunting program to, "reach out to HLT, or come out and help volunteer at an HLT event to chat with other volunteers and get your foot in the door. It may not happen the first or second year, but it's worth it in the long run. The hunting is great, but the personal rewards are even better!"
